Course Description:

Theory and practice in fundamentals of acting including the actor's process, improvisation, ensemble work, and stage vocabulary.

Learning Objectives:

- Identify and effectively apply fundamental acting vocabulary, techniques, and processes in practical acting situations.
- Use and integrate acting skills, including control of the actor's instrument (voice and body), collaboration, play instinct, imagination, flexibility, courage, focus, discipline, and communication.
- Build effective collaborations through creativity, self-awareness, confidence, and sensitivity to self and others.

Methods of Instruction:

This class involves intellectual and experiential exploration of the acting process. The plan of study for this course includes:

In-class demonstrations and explorations

Laboratory activities designed to help students put theory into practice

Homework assignments

Observation of live performance within and outside of class

Self and peer critiques

Attendance:

Attendance is vital to success in this class. As with any rehearsal or performance, absences affect both the individual student's progress and the progress of the class as a whole. Be on time, dressed in comfortable clothes and shoes that allow you to move, bend, sit on the floor, etc. You will be expected to participate fully in class exercises and to rehearse and memorize performance projects outside of class time.

Each student is permitted two unexcused absences in this course. Each subsequent unexcused absence will automatically lower the "Preparation and Participation" grade by 15 points. It is possible to achieve negative points in this category.

An excused absence is defined as: 1) a medical emergency or illness, 2) death in the immediate family (grandparents included), 3) university sanctioned activities. Official documentation and advance notification is required for an absence to count as "excused."

Note: Arriving late to class more than once will impact your attendance grade.

Deadlines:

Assignments are due in class on the day assigned. Assignments will drop one letter grade for each day that they are late. **An assignment turned in after class time will be considered one day late, so plan ahead.** Save your work, have ink in your printer, keep your dog from eating your thumb drive, etc.

Assignments due on the date of campus-sanctioned activity absences must be turned in prior to the absence date. The student is responsible for making up all work missed because of absences.

Play Attendance:

Students must attend the following ISU Theatre productions: *Treasure Island* (Oct. 2-11), *The Magic Flute* (Nov. 5-8), and *Love and Information* (Dec. 4-13).

Tickets can be purchased at the Stephens box office. You can also see the shows for free by signing up to usher in the Main Theatre Office (Pearson 2130. Failure to attend a production will result in two unexcused absences per production missed.

Grading Scale:

A- to A = 900-1000 pts. Exceptional work: Always prepared; extensive outside-of-class preparation; self-motivated. Active, positive contributor to class. Punctual; always present. Makes significant improvements in skill and knowledge during semester.

B- to B+=800-899 pts. Good work: Always prepared; significant outside-of-class preparation; self-motivated. Punctual; always present. Positive contributor to class. Notable improvement in skills and knowledge during semester.

C-to C+ = **700-799 pts.** Average work: Generally prepared; adequate outside-of-class preparation; often self-motivated. Often contributes to class. Punctual; almost always present. Demonstrates improvement in skills and knowledge during semester.

D-to D+ = 600-699 pts. Below average work: Often not prepared; shows lack of outside preparation; rarely self-motivated. Seldom contributes to class and/or may have negative attitude. Sometimes late; some absences. Little skill and knowledge improvement demonstrated during semester.

F = 599 pts and below. Unacceptable work: Rarely prepared and lacks adequate outside-of-class preparation; not

motivated. Does not contribute to class and/or may have negative attitude. Not punctual; several absences. Virtually no growth demonstrated in skills and knowledge.

Please note:

The theatre explores the full range of human experience and perspectives. Some of the assigned plays, performances, and class discussions will cover sensitive material that may be offensive to some people. It is not the objective of this course or the instructor to change anyone's worldview, and students will be encouraged to share their opinions and perspectives on material covered throughout the course.

To avoid plagiarism, document the source when using words or ideas from another person's work, (including printed, spoken, and electronic sources).

To document direct quotations in APA or MLA style, writers must:

- □ include quotation marks around the material or indent it within the text to indicate their use of the source;
- provide appropriate parenthetical notation;
- \Box include the name of the author (if available) or the title (if no author is given) either in the introduction to the quotation or within the parenthetical citation.

To document a direct quotation in an oral presentation, speakers must:

- □say the word "quote" to verbally replace written quotation marks; and
- \Box include the name of the author (if available) or the title (if no author is given) either immediately before or after the quotation.
- □ outline oral presentations consistent with the above rules for written material.

If you paraphrase facts and/or ideas of others, by fully considering the ideas, then stating them in your own words and sentence structure; you must still credit the sources.
